Celebrate Girls IDG 2021

Pokhara

11th October, 2021

The Children Protection Home, Hemja celebrated International Day of Girl Child (IDGC) by conducting inhouse programs on the theme, 'Digital Generation, Our Generation' among children and in coordination with the anti-human trafficking project, Pokhara. A series of different programs were conducted like orientation on IDGC day, making art, taking awareness video as well as sharing it with the OVN networks. The children also shared their art with the AHT project and participated in jingle where one of the children also represented CP home in jingle making.


The in-house sessions were facilitated and coordinated by CPO and was supervised by CP Home in charge. A total of 17 children actively participated and gave their inputs in the planning and coordination of the events for the IDGC celebration.

Objective

- To reflect and share about the IDGC and its importance.
- To reflect on the usage of internet and the gender divide in digital platform.
- To substantiate our learning from the programs through art.

On 6th to 11th October the activities were carried out. Many of the sessions on IDGC were facilitated by the Child Protection officer for the children where we shared and discussed on how the celebration began in order to address the rights of girl child and address unique issues related to the girl child. The children participated actively and shared their challenges as they were also actively taking virtual classes and session during the pandemic. They also shared how boys seemed to be more comfortable with online tools in the virtual setting than the girls. The session also touched upon the gender divide on digital platform where although girls have comparatively less exposure than boys, but are more prone to cyber bullying, online child sexual exploitation as well as abuse. Therefore, safety measures while using internet were also highlighted in the session. Also the multiple benefits of using the digital world for girls to learn, connect, and grow was also emphasized. It was a fruitful session for the first event to go ahead with other celebrations.

It was an impactful program as it enhanced children's knowledge on girl child, imparted their responsibility to speak up for themselves as well as explored their creativity as they participated in the session, shared their learning in video and expressed it in the form of art. Likewise, it also made them aware about the opportunities and potential risks in the digital platform. Thus, they have to be aware while using the internet. And more specifically, as girl child they gathered their experiences how girls and boys are divided while accessing the internet as well besides all the unique experiences they share a girl child. The whole series of program was important to celebrate and yielded a positive impact on our girls, although the program would have been more effective if it had collaborated with other networking partners.





Goa 11th October 2021

International Day for Girl Child was observed on 11th October, 2021 in Goa. There were a total 55 participants: 44 girls, 3 boys, 5 volunteers and 3 staff.

Sr. Monica the program Coordinator of Good Shepherd Social Service center began the event with the opening prayer and introductory speech saying that the UN has declared this day, 11th October as IDG in 2012 to promote equality among the boys and girls, to provide opportunity for holistic development of the girl children. We need to create awareness to promote equal opportunity for girls and boys. They are the two wheels of the society. They need each other to lead the society in the right direction.

Mr. Peter F. Borges, the Chairperson of Goa State Commission for Protection of Child Rights was the Chief Guest. He emphasized on rights of the children such as Right to education, Right to survival, Right to identity, right to recreation, right to freedom of expression etc. He urged them not to be silent when their rights are violated and basic needs are not met but to raise their voices. He assured them that if they sent him any genuine written complaints regarding violation of their rights, he would take action. He promised them to visit their residential area to assess their living conditions. It was a participatory session. All the children actively took part in the session.

The children performed a cultural program based on Rights of the Girl Child. 15 children participated in the drawing competition on the theme. There was an active participation of children.







On 16th October 2021, the girls from 8 villages decked themselves to celebrate their day. They wanted to show to the world that they are happy to be girls and proud to be a girl. We had the celebration in the village as the Pandemic has not said good bye to Karjat.

The Village Animators were asked to explain to the families the specialty of the day and the worth of girl child in the family, in the society and in the world. The beauty of girl child in the planet adds beauty to the entire universe. The programme began with a prayer dance where girls put their steps together and raised their hands to thank our God, the creator to express their gratitude for creating the Girl in His own image and likeness.

Children were asked to draw an image of them or of any kind picture which projects the significance of the day. It was a great surprise that each one beautifully drew an image and displayed.

The programme continued with their cultural programmes where the villagers joined in the celebration and realized the worth of the Girl child in the family. The message reached to the heart of each person present that Girl child should be valued and respected, have equal attitude towards both boy and girl in the family and in the society. The head of the village was asked speak and the talk was around upholding girl children in the society. Let us not neglect our daughters but give them equal rights as boys.

Virar

18th November 2021

The program was organized at Bhiwandi-Good Shepherd Social Action Center. About 116 participants were able to be part of this celebration. The event began with the lighting of the lamb, the traditional way of invoking God's Presence.

The tableau was enacted on the theme 'Digital Generation' by the children from Virar.

Mrs. Nutan B. Khade enlightened the children with the theme digital generation, our generation. He said that we must take into account the diverse digital realities that girls face and the ways in which these can deepen the gender divide around connectivity, skills and online safety. Globally, 2.2 billion people below the age of 25 do not have internet access at home, with girls more likely to be cut off. Those who do get online, too often encounter cyber violence. In a recent survey of 14,000 girls in 31 countries, more than half (58 per cent) had been harassed and abused online.

These realities are compounded for girls with poor access to internet or non-availability of electricity and those living in conflict or crisis situations that compromise their right to education and access to enabling technology. We cannot afford for girls to be left out of the digital transformation.

On this International Day of the Girl, let us work together to ensure that girls are connected, supported and empowered so that we can co-lead the journey of digital transformation. She gave an opportunity to express themselves as how they cope with this situation. Some of the children expressed spontaneously which surprised the Chief guest.
