The Campaign on International Girl child day was organised by the Good Shepherd Sisters in Garratola on 4<sup>th</sup> December 2020. The children participated in various activities such as; explaining the child safeguarding poster, awareness on rights of girl child, cultural programme, etc.

Mrs. Antheshiya Kujur explained the importance of October 11 as the International Day of the Girl Child. Mrs. Savitha explained, the IDG is not for girls alone, but also for boys to understand and respect girls as equals. Though the exploitation, violence and abuse are experienced by both boys and girls, the girls go through more such violation of rights and the society needs to take steps to protect the girls.

Sr. Manjula explained the ways the girls can protect themselves, especially from sexual abuse. All girls must know about the good touch and bad touch.

### Day-One: 03/12/2020, Good Shepherd Bahari, Assam

Bahari, in Assam kick started the programme on 3<sup>rd</sup> December 2020.

One day campaign on "Our Responsibility in Safeguarding Children" took place in five government and private schools in Bahari. The key message for the was "The children are the future of our society; at the same time, they are vulnerable". Therefore, as adults it's our responsibility to safeguard their rights and give them their due. About 800 children and school staff witnessed the event. The school children realised that they need to speak out and make their voice heard. Unless they speak out they will not realise their rights.

The poster on Child Safeguarding was explained to the participants and the need of protecting the girl children

and their rights was stressed.



The girls should have the freedom to resist the bad touch. Today the crimes against girl children have increased and everyday we read news on crimes. The children themselves must learn to identify the safe and unsafe environments so that they can protect themselves. At the same time, they should raise their voice against any violence of their rights

The Sisters and the staff created awareness on "What is child abuse"? as per the Congregational documents on Safe Guarding Policy. The following aspects were explained

- Child needs to be corrected in a polite way rather than using abusive words.
- Child needs space for its own discoveries
- No one should tease a child.
- Child need to be taught that their body need to respected.
- Child needs to be protected from unhealthy touch.

Mrs. Kalpana explained about the Rights of the Child. These rights encompass freedom of children and their civil rights, family environment, necessary healthcare and welfare, education, leisure and cultural activities and special protection measures.

A healthy sense of competition in designing the logo and posters added great flavour. The students, teachers and parents (specially dads and brothers) were educated through sessions on *online safety for children*, especially during this pandemic, apart from sensitizing them on their role in redesigning the future of girls in their homes and society. One of the video entries made it to the IDG Summit.

The energized young students decided to step up the campaign by reaching out to their peers. "Put a period to the period taboo" camp to demystify menstruation opened the doors for more voices to join in.



The Intra and Inter School cultural events – IDG PHOENIX'20 provided a platform for the Phoenix within them to rise from their ashes and voice their thoughts and redefine themselves as change makers of the Future. Fifteen schools across Chennai participated in a 3- day program, stirring the participants to voice out. Seize every platform: Good Shepherd Ideas Worth Spreading (GSIWS) is a Sampoorna initiative which was started by a group of students and teachers who believe in vertical literacy with the main goal of providing a safe forum for students to express their thoughts, views and ideas on various topics including issues grappling today's society such as racism, rights of the LGBTQ+ community, cyber bullying, mental health etc. Through GSIWS, the students collaborated across GS schools in India to bridge the gap with their brothers and sisters across Good Shepherd communities in Central East India/ Nepal. GSIWS aims for students to achieve a combination of mental complexity, emotional intelligence and transformed world view, so that they can be active change makers and advocates in today's society.



If not now, when, if not you, who? Act upon your thought! "Rethink, Rework and Redefine" - a panel discussion on December 7, 2020 marks the onset of new

beginnings. Good Shepherd School took the next concrete step to collaborate with ePratYek, an organization of Edmond Rice Foundation in India and invited the boys and girls from various schools to come together to raise their voice for an equitable world. The participants have agreed on pursuing one or more areas of advocacy that they wish to lobby for and spearhead a movement of change in 2021.





## Good Shepherd, Salem

#### ood Shevherd Mulakalavalli

The "International Day of the Girl Child" was held at the Good Shepherd Convent, Mulakalapalli in Telangana with the theme "My Voice=Our Future". 220 girls, staff, sisters and resource persons participated in a rally. Lighting of the lamp was done symbolically; representing the lives of the girl child to be illumined by education and gaining self-confidence. Girls performed a beautiful awareness dance motivating other children to think high and work hard towards the achievements like Kalpana Chawla, Mother Theresa and Kiran Bedi.

The resource persons; Mrs. Annamani (Headmistress of the Govt. High School- Mulakalapalli), Mrs. Mehramani (MPTC), Mr. Rammurthy (Police Constable), Fr. Goa Showaraiah (Principal of Jeevan Jyothi E.M. School, Mulakalapalli) were present on the dais.

Mr. Ramurthy, oriented the participants on girls and women's rights. He said human transformation is needed to reduce violence and abuse of girls. He gave his personal examples of working hard, undergoing humiliation of poverty and how he became the police officer. He mentioned about the 33% reservation for girls in Police Department. Thus, he advised them to be the daring leaders and to come forward to take up higher tasks in the society.



Mrs. Mehramani MPTC local power holder, insisted on being courageous and persistent in achieving the goal in life and spoke about the promotion of girls' empowerment and the fulfillment of their human rights. The adolescent girls have their rights to safety, education and healthy life. She differentiated olden days with present scenario. "In olden days Girl children were killed, but now girls are reaching even to the sky without the help of anybody and there is no field without the presence of girls.

Fr. Goa Showaraiah said, "You girls are privileged to get help and guidance, especially through awareness and educational sponsorship programs; so, keep your aim focused." He stressed on the importance of the education and human values.



Mrs. Annamani motivated the girls to study well and to be in a good position by which the girls are not dominated by the male sector. She advised; "Please do not waste time, money and energy; rather take personal responsibility to read books to enhance your knowledge and information.




